Thank you to all our staff and volunteers for their hard work and dedication to the mountain – today we served 120 bowls of chilis for lunch – this is the largest turnout I've seen!

### **Financial Report - Eric Sprenger**

ES We have 1.5-1.6 million total funds split between 100k as a contingency and \$1.2m in a short term in a GIC and then another 100-150k in a chequing account and lastly another 100k in a GIC.

### **Director Reports**

#### **Dean Hunchuk, Director of Buildings and Construction, Chair of Building Subcommittee**

- New Lodge Building Subcommittee: Vice Chair - Dean Hunchuk
  - Update: Unfortunately, this year, again, has not gone as planned. The engineered drawings with reviews done by architects were completed in May of this year (much later than anticipated). A cost analysis was completed at the end

of May and regrettably the estimated cost to build the new lodge was projected to be around \$1.9-\$2.0m.

- Collectively the board felt this was way over our allotted budget and we quickly pivoted to see if the money secured through the grant could be used to upgrade and enhance our old lodge.

Thank you to Helen and Casey!

- This is now what we're doing with the grant money:
  1. Improving the septic system.
  2. adding additional washrooms and laundry facility to the side of the old lodge.
  3. replacing the roof
  4. improving the foundation and bottom floor configuration (ski shop).
  5. improving the kitchen and main floor configuration with the following improvements (new industrial fan, new wood stove, new sunroom area and back deck, closing off the upper lodge with safety doors
  6. new electrical throughout entire lodge.
  7. new and improved rental rooms and washroom on the 3<sup>rd</sup> (hostel floor).
  8. new deck and entrance way on the front on the ol'lodge.
  9. moving the composting toilets above the parking lot beside L1
- This is now what we're doing with the grant money: The site permit application has been submitted. The grant money needs to be spent by March 31. 2024. Helen and Casey Brown have begun to demo and reno. With some luck and a lot of help, we believe the majority of the work will be complete by Christmas this year.

Erin – not unlike what has happened at other ski hills in terms of changes. we will meet the intent of the grant; the old lodge is the heart and the soul of the place. Big thanks to Dean for shouldering.

Dave S- Not a waste we now have plans and designs, that will assist with other grants in the future, we have something to work off.

Neil B- thank you Helen and Casey, but we need to be cognizant of perception when it comes to awarding contracts.

## **Max Oudendag, Director RV Parks**

### **Review of Last AGM:**

As I was new to the Board last year, I had only a few months in the RV Park Director position heading into the 2022 AGM. I joined the RV Park Sub-committee as part of my involvement and was part of a plan to build a second area to house the original RV park if needed, to move. Upon further investigation, we concluded that the first RV park could stay in place as we were addressing the 'boundary issue' by applying for a base area expansion. The new border, if and when approved, would include the area of the RV park that is slightly outside our Controlled

Recreation Area. At the last AGM, I presented the idea of moving a number of deserving individuals into the new RV Space. This statement initiated a very spirited conversation about how Mount Cain operates, and how those who are contributing to the operation of Mount Cain can be better supported with 'affordable housing'.

In accordance with the RV Park's mission Statement (see below), we chose to move forward with this plan and initiated an application process, and awarded 9 new RV spots based on past, current, and potential for future involvement in Mt. Cain's operations. We received over 50 applications and considered each and every one of them. Once we (as a board) agreed upon our list of 'winners', I engaged the applicants and invited them to move into our new RV area. To a great extent, this process has already begun, as is visually quite clear. These applicants have been granted their Rental Spaces for one year, with the understanding that they may need to move out at the end of the season. The physical setup of the new RV park allows for easy exit and/or removal of each RV. As I set up in my first year as RV Park Director, tenants will be allowed to apply for 'moveout exemption' if they 1) fulfilled their volunteer/employee requirements, and 2) plan to continue to provide 'meaningful contribution' to MCAPS operations in the following season.

The tenants in the original RV Park follow the same requirements and have the same opportunity as the tenants in the new RV Park as they did this year. For the 2022-23 season, RV Park tenants were tasked with providing at least 40 hours of volunteerism or paid work that directly helps MCAPS operations. They then had the opportunity to present their case for 'moveout exemption' in a written form, based on the merits of their contribution. The board deliberated on these forms and concluded that 10 of the original 11 RV Park Tenants would be granted 'exemption', allowing them to remain in place over the past summer and throughout the 23-24 Winter Season.

Mission Statement: The RV Park's mission, moving forward, is to promote volunteer and staff retention at MCAPS by providing unique and affordable accommodation options, primarily for long-term and dedicated volunteers and staff.

Neil B – “We shouldn’t kick people out of the RV park for having a bad year or two.”

Jamie T - “Are there still RVs outside the base operation” Max U- Yes there is but we are managing the situation, and in the initial steps for a base area expansion request/ remapping.

Geof G -“ I think there is a disproportionate amount of time spent discussing the RV park”

Kelly W. “More communication with people who have applied, more openness around what the criteria/terms are”

Rob Webb “Eviction looked bad from our perspective”

Campbell W "My concern is that we've created a ghetto" "We were going to reduce the numbers due to the boundary and now we have more grey water going to contaminate the environment"  
Erin – Grey water will be managed, and we need these people to care for our mountain"  
Campbell W "I've never seen an RV park person carry a bucket across the parking lot"  
Erin – There is an outhouse in the RV park that is used. Residents sign agreements that include grey water management.

Adding a washroom near the new RV park is in the plan. Until that time the new tenants have been informed and agreed to use the Plumbed toilets for their needs – including grey water.

\*Concerns from membership that questions and concerns by membership have been shut down or not addressed when the RV park is discussed. - There remains a feeling of "them vs us".

### **David Mazzucchi, Director of Grant Applications**

The 2023-23 Sponsorship calendar/poster raised over \$12,000. This season we plan to start contacting sponsors in November, rather than December.

In November 2022, we unsuccessfully applied to the B.C. Destination Development Fund to build a safe, easily accessible, lit-up, toboggan-only slope. No feedback was provided as to why the application was unsuccessful.

In January 2023, we met with Michelle Babchuk, MLA - North Island and Kellen Truant, the Operations Manager for Vancouver Island District - SA03, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to discuss the funding that MCAPS receives to clear snow on the access road. The Ministry agreed to renew the funding agreement of \$15,000 per year for an unspecified amount of time.

We have been meeting with our grant liaison and reporting to the Community Economic Recovery Infrastructure Program (CERIP) regarding the grant that was initially to build a new Day Lodge. A Change of Scope was approved to use the money to renovate the old Day Lodge instead. Building renovations need to be consistent with the initial intent of the grant, to meet MCAPS needs for a new Ski Patrol space, Ski Shop and Rental Shop, accommodation, and washrooms.

I welcome any information from MCAPS members on grants that may be a good fit for us to apply for.

### **Alec McBeath, Director of Administration,**

CanWest Ski Area Association liaison

### **Mike Green, Director of Operations, Roads and Generators**

We continue to push forward with road improvements at Mount Cain. We will not have as much work on the road as last year, but like a couple of years ago we had an investment in preparing rock for future surfacing work. We also got some blasting done to help with drainage in a couple of much needed spots. I want to acknowledge the continued support of the Ministry of Forests and their staff in Port McNeill. They continue to increase support for us and recognize how important access is for recreation on the North Island.

Our equipment is in good shape (for its age!) and I want to thank everyone who helps with mechanical work, particularly Kevin Moore, Lemare Lake Logging, Randy Engle, Dave Howich among others. It is a continuous challenge keeping our aged equipment going weekend after weekend. We have maintenance work planned for the D8 and Grader scheduled for this fall.

As always, a huge shout out to the volunteer grader operators Stuart Abernethy, Dan Fear, Peter Knott, Sandy Masales, and Campbell Wilson. Many, many early mornings without a lot of fanfare. They are the critical link to keep us open. Also, Campbell and Linda for their work in opening things up on Thursday and Friday and helping to refine our safety procedures. If anyone has an interest in working on the grader, please let me know. Thank you to all the volunteers who jumped in to help with advice, time, and expertise over the year. It is unfortunate that I was unable to attend the AGM this year. It has been a long time since I missed a volunteer weekend and will have to miss out on the Cain community spirit.

### **Christian Tuters - Ski Shop and Snow School Director**

Last season saw challenges with suppliers for the Merchandise in the ski shop. We have been working over the summer to correct that with some key changes going into this year. We are bringing in some new suppliers, rebuilding relationships with previous suppliers that have served us well in the past. Additionally, we are bringing back a former ski shop manager to help with fall ordering and consulting on the selection of available items in the shop.

Jenna Cramb will be returning as Manager of the Ski Shop and Ski School this season. I would like to thank her for the work she did last year and for continuing to be a valued part of the team this year. Jenna has been working in various capacities at Mount Cain for over 10 years.

The Ski Shop is looking for a handful of new employees. They will be responsible for providing a professional and courteous customer experience to our ski shop patrons when they purchase merchandise or rent equipment.

We are looking at the viability of opening the online store back up pre-opening weekend for holiday season purchases. If the online store proves to be a feasible option, it will close when the mountain opens and not run in tandem with the physical ski shop.

Ski School is always looking for qualified instructors for both ski and snowboard lessons. We are looking into having a ski instructor course held at Mount Cain.

Wolf Pack, the goal of Wolf Pack is to teach the children of our most passionate Cain members a love for the mountain. We want the Wolf Pack members to grow up wanting to give back to the mountain. In the interest of facilitating this goal there will be some changes in the pricing structure of Wolf Pack this year. We are anticipating that this will increase participation in the program. As such we need more volunteering coaches to help shape the future of Mount Cain. The Pack rides on Sundays skipping lift lines and sending it off every jump possible. If you are interested in being a volunteer Wolf Pack coach, please let us know. We are also looking into getting parental support and feedback this, in the for of Wolf Pack parents meeting and perhaps team manager / admin.

Magic Monday school groups, Barb Colbourne has graciously committed to continue as groups coordinator. I would like to thank Barb for all that she does organizing the school groups. We are always looking for volunteers to help with instruction and on hill facilitation for Monday school groups.

## **Drew Nagainis – Health and Safety Director**

- I am happy to join the board of directors for the 2022-2023 season as health and safety director for MCAPS and am looking forward to continuing my directorship for this upcoming season on Mount Cain.
- Collected Safe Work Practices from Managers and Directors on their day-to-day roles on Mount Cain and filed together, planning to get signed copies by all employees this 23/24 season
- Implemented the Snowmobile operator's competency test to improve our operations safety on the Ski Hill for employees and patrons. Ran all our lift operators through the course and our ski patrol that would be operating mountain sleds
- Kaerus Group, our insurance provider, has sent us our risk management report for last year's season and to keep up with their requests I am planning to add permanently mounted whips (6-foot flag) and Beacons/alarms on all mountain owned sleds. Adding daily equipment safety check to Mountain Sleds with proper documentation.
- Recently had a Teams meeting with the north island area manager for B.C.E.H.S to Communicate our ERP and EVAC plans. Planning to get the 4x4 sent up when access road conditions are poor. Discussed Radio communications and alternate modes of transportation off the hill.
- Last year's WCB Net Rate for 2023 is 4.43. Same rate as 2022. Waiting to hear what the 2024 rate will be. WCB will inform me of this year's rate by early fall. I am planning to attend a Seminar Via Teams this week to see what we can do to get those rates back down to a more reasonable rate.
