David Mazzucchi – Board Chair

AGM called to order at 6:17 PM. Thank you to everyone for being here to the 47th annual meeting. We appreciate everyone's efforts today. We saw a lot of new faces, a lot of old faces. Let's start off with the land acknowledgement.

1. Land Acknowledgement – David Mazzucchi

Today we are gathered here at Mount Cain, located in the territory of the 'Namgis First Nation. The mountainous area near the Davie River, known as Papikalan, meaning 'place of marmots. The Mount Cain Alpine Society honours and respects our relationship with this nation and is grateful to be able to recreate on these lands. Acknowledgement of how great it was to see people working together and smiling during our work party. A great community.

4. Chair's Report

It's been a very trying year. The ski conditions were less than great. We did manage to operate a few times where we did generate a bit of money. We also were able to keep our employees enough to get through the season, which is one of the missions of Mount Cain, to employ the youth of the north island, so we were successful enough in that remark.

Wadington District - Grant in aid situation:

- Our grant in Aid Funding Application was initially rejected mid-March.
- At the Planning Meeting we removed mandatory membership to purchase lift tickets; two-tier pricing with non-MCAPS members paying 15% more instead.
- Clarification on how accommodation and RV spots are allotted. They were happy with our response.

- In the future, please raise issues about Mt Cain operations to the Board through the info@MountCain.com email.

Question from member: What was the grant amount for? - \$40,000 - for a long time, but the amount has gone up.

5. Financial Report

- MCAPS financial situation continues to be healthy despite a very poor season last year.
- The 2023/2024 season ended with a net loss of \$125,477. The loss can be attributed to the poor snow conditions and limited number of operating days.
- Some expenses from last season should result in discounts this season. For example, we should be able to get some insurance costs pro-rated, and we likely won't need to purchase as much fuel/propane this season.
- Current account balances:
 - Chequing – \$178,000
 - Savings - \$57,000
 - Contingency Fund GIC – \$108,000
 - Long term savings GIC - \$324,000
- A motion was made at the planning meeting to increase the contingency fund to \$200,000, this will be completed when the GIC renews in October.

Question from member: What was the fund balance, what does it include? - It is 2 separate funds, top is all the assets of the hill (physical and upgrades) and the other fund is all the funds we have in the bank.

Question from member: How much do we have in the GIC? - 108k bumped to 200k from our checking account

Question from member: What are we getting for the GIC rate? - 2ish % - locked in year to year and long-term savings is a cashable GIC

Question from member: Contingency fund, did we not up it to \$200K before? - No, it's been \$100K.

6. Directors reports

6.1 Hospitality Report - Kieren Britton

Cafe / Lodge

- Reintroduced the tender process, Jamie has been granted the role for the next two seasons.
- Every second year we will go out to tender once again.

Accommodations

- Sally is our new Accommodations Manager and will also be one of our cleaners. Huge thank you to Megan Walters for her time in this role.
- We are not offering the volunteer lottery this year but are open to suggestions moving forward.
- We will be working with the ticket booth to offer walk-up bookings when vacant
- Dishes are now in our accommodation facilities
- Cancellation processes in low snow seasons are shifting:
 - Accommodations manager will reach out 5 weeks before the accommodation booking to give guests the opportunity to plan / decide
 - The waitlist process is improving, more details to come soon.

- Cancellation policy will be shifting from 4 weeks to 3 weeks to accommodate low snow years.
- Namgis accommodation pending, if this goes through we will need to expand our accommodations team to handle the extra workload

Question from member: Are the bookings available on Tuesdays or going back to how it was before? – It will be staying the same as last season.

Question from member: What is the status on the Namgis rental situation? Is it a rental? - The two individuals in conversation with the Namgis are not here. More information coming soon. However this is more of a collaboration and a profit share, not just a rental.

6.2 Director of Technology + Ticket Booth Report

Ticket Booth:

- Increase lift ticket prices, volunteer passes, rentals, and ski lessons by 2.5%.
- No change in the price of Season's pass.
- High Five passes should start being available in retail stores around the north island, hopefully in time for this season.
- Raised the price of the high-five pass from \$213.18 to \$250.

Technology:

- We are looking to transition the website to a platform that is easier to manage.
- There have been some complaints about the accommodation booking software, we will review the software at the end of the season and make changes for the 2025/2026 season. We welcome any feedback anyone has on the current software.
- Free Wifi is coming to the lodge! Ha! Just kidding.

Question from member: Will the increase in ticket prices affect school groups? - No school groups will remain the same.

Question from member: Seasons passes were not increasing, is there a reason for that? - We felt as though they were expensive enough already.

- Not in line with the rise in the price of the day ticket price? - Seasons price was a bit higher than was fair

Question from member: Last year we offered free skiing for children under 18 are we still offering that? - We will need to discuss this. Last year this was brought forward during spring break due to the difficult time.

Question from member: High 5 is an adult ticket price, is there a High 5 for students or only adults? - We left it because if you were a student the price was very low. These were for adult passes only.

6.3 Communications Report - read by Kieren, written by Erin Pickering.

It wasn't the most fun year to be communications director, having to send more bad news than good. Alas, I hope folks enjoyed the musical element of my newsletters and felt that I represented MCAPS well when featured on local radio.

It has been an interesting ride being a member of this board for the last 8 years and chairing it through 2 pandemic and post pandemic years. I am grateful for the work and energy that directors put in and will appreciate being able to play on this hill from a member's perspective in the winter to come.

MCAPS should consider looking at a new website, one that might be easier to manage without a webmaster. Big thank you to Brittany who has provided help and web mastering over the last number of years. I will make myself available to the incoming director to help with transitions.

6.4 Buildings, Maintenance, and Construction Report

Well, the building portfolio has been...interesting and challenging at times over the last few years (to put it mildly)!

But now we have a refurbished lodge which includes:

5. New electrical throughout the whole building
6. New metal roof
7. New heating (wood stove and pipe) and propane heater in ski shop.
8. New front deck gathering area
9. Expanded ski shop area
10. Water fill station
11. Fresh accommodations
12. And finally - flushing toilets!!

This was a massive effort by a LOT of individuals but special thanks to Stewart Abernethy, Lucas Smith, Scotty McLaren, Jean-Luc Kokol, Sean O'Hanley, and Trevor Hatelt. But without a doubt the two folks that took on this project and delivered are Helen & Casey Brown – we would have lost the grant money had they not stepped up and just ran with it. I can't fully express my gratitude - just an incredible effort – thanks so much you two!!

A couple more improvements – composting toilets moved over to L1 and a new outhouse in the new RV park (thanks to Mike Green, Colin & Dyson Hunko, Matt Tjepkema (the stair master) and Drew Nagainis to name a few).

But there's more work to be done! Finish the kitchen and cafe area (new hood fan, flooring and sunroom) and complete the ski shop "tech" area update. We're also looking to provide the ski patrol building with a better washroom facility (more accessible for injured patients).

- Only doing necessary projects due to the low snow year
- Sun room area and the below in the ski shop are in the works
- Higher on the list is the ski patrol washroom

A huge shoutout again to Helen and Casey, Stuart Abernethy, Campbell Wilson, and my two rocks Jean-Luc & Sally who have taken on so much and make this portfolio not only manageable but enjoyable!!

Question from member: Concerned about the heating upstairs. Not a lot of heat with the new flue. If we have very cold weeks there might be some problems with our accommodations. - Because of the new codes the flue that goes all the way through to the roof has to be double walled. The old system had a cage with a single wall. That's why it changed. It might need to be pushed up on the list.

- What about fans to push the heat - The old building and fire code restrictions make that hard. We might have to put a fire door on the lower level to eliminate transfer. Another option is a furnace downstairs or radiator. We will need to discuss this further.

6.5 Snow Machines / Events Report

Groomers

We did belts last fall on black cat, as well as welding repairs to the frame prior to the season starting. The lack of snow is hard on the cats and it's really a fine line opening vs not opening so we tried to find that balance to be accountable to our members. We had a few repairs that needed to be done mid-season as well. And upon end of season inspections determined we are in need of more belt changes on the red cat which was done today.

The sleds are getting older, our two work horse sleds are the scandics which are 11 and 15 years old. They do give us trouble from time to time which can pose operational challenges, but a big thanks to Byron for looking after the fleet this year. We have purchased a new sled last week from Courtenay Motorsport which will help breathe some new life into our fleet. This will be a larger machine capable of towing heavy loads and has been a work horse for our friends at Mt Washington

Events

This was a tough year for events. Obviously, Cain Cup did not happen, however we did pull off a great combination of BCF/Viking Fest which considering how much of a yo-yo season we had was a huge accomplishment. Our amazing sponsors came through as they always do to help support our raffle and beer garden fundraising efforts which were much needed this year. We had hoped to pull off another great Kidsfest, but unfortunately Mother Nature just didn't cooperate.

This upcoming year we look forward to doing a full lineup of events, including a new one which will be the 12 hours of Pain for the ski patrol fundraiser, which will be a 12-hour skinning relay competition, so start training and looking for teammates, more details to come on that.

Question from member: This will involve a ski patrol response due to the high levels of pain? - Maybe

Question from member: Do we have enough portable AEDs for this one? - We will investigate it.

6.6 Ski Shop and Snow School Report

Couple things:

Mackenzie has agreed to take the reins from Jenna who is pursuing other things. Mackenzie has been a cain staffer for a while and is a great fit. She is traveling for a bit and will come back after xmas.

Starting to replace the aging fleet of rental equipment, slowing doing it year over year to ensure we don't lose a ton of rentals when the [indemnified] list is launched in two weeks.

Jenna is coming on as a consultant for Makenzie.

Some changes to prices to reflect inflation. Should be on the website already.

We are going to run a snowboard course this year. If there is enough interest, we will host a ski instructor one as well. Spring break.

Statement by member: We would rather keep our money here if we can.

Question from member: Could we advertise it early season for a tentative date and a waitlist? Was the snowboard course in-house? - It was filled but we had no snow. We moved it three times.

Question from member: With the indemnification list that comes out each year what is the % turnover? - Gear gets tested each year, some bindings last 10 years, some last 20 years. It's not a consistent list because every ski/binding is different. We lose about 5 or so skis every year. We are buying skis this year.

6.7 Grants Report

- CERIP - Mount Cain Lodge and Ski Shop renovations and washroom improvements project
100% Expenditure Report was submitted in March and was accepted.
 - \$873K
- We are registered for the Fall outtake for BC Tourism Sustainability Network Funding. Needs assessment on Oct 3rd. A previous application (road to L2) was deemed not a good-fit. Focus this time will be a backup power supply that will facilitate the use of the phone and internet without running a generator.
 - Meeting with an advisor to get a different proposal accepted this time.
- Meaghan Douglas is willing to help with the 2024-25 poster again. We will honour unused sponsor lift tickets in a show of good faith and include 2023-24 sponsors on the 2024-25 poster.

Question from member: What are the tickets? - Some companies will buy in and get 5 or 10 tickets for their staff.

6.8 Operations- Ski Patrol Report

I took over from Greg who has been director for 6 years, so it was a smooth-running portfolio. Cain can be a really great place where things can go smoothly and easily. It was a good year.

6.9 Operations - Road/Generators Report – read by Dean, written by Mike Green

We continue to push forward with road improvements at Mount Cain. We got quite a bit more surfaced in the fall than I had anticipated at the last AGM report. There are plans for some work this fall, including grading before the snow flies. I can't thank the Ministry of Forests, and their staff enough for their work on

Forest Service Roads, here at Cain, and the North Island in general. As a North Islander I recognize how important, and how costly it is to maintain and service roads for recreation.

Our D8 continues to have engine issues, but we are working to solve them ahead of the season, and we have a backup plan in case we can't.

We have a small team working on a plan to upgrade our ancient and thirsty generators. We should be recommending a new system to the board in the next few months. Whether this will happen this year or next, besides a board decision will depend on equipment availability and perhaps the need for more usage readings to ensure we have a well-designed system for the long term.

As always, I want to thank a long list of people that probably sound familiar to a lot of you – but I really lean on a lot of people such as operators, mechanics, expert advice, and help. Some years it is a massive amount of work, and others it is small but the following always come through when the mountain comes calling.

Question from member: What's the plan if the D8 doesn't work out? - Using a second cat.

Question from member: When are they going to pave the road? - Don't hold your breath.

6.10 Operations- Lifts Report read by Dean, written by Dave Steele

6.12 Occupational Health and Safety Report, written by Drew Nagainis

Worked on improving our health and safety plan. Will do an annual snowmobile safety course. Had discussions with BC Ambulance service to emphasize how important it is to send their 4-wheel drive rig when needed. Been in touch with Work safe and have a solid plan on forming a safety committee and holding monthly meetings with staff to discuss safety priorities. Improving our paper trail and logbooks to reach a safety standard at Mount Cain.

Question from member: Curious if there is a building fire what is in place as far as people trained to put the fire out? Other than fire extinguishers? - we might need to develop a volunteer committee. Lisa offers to investigate ideas around a fire plan.

Statement by member: We have had a run at that a few times for training. We have hoses and pumps but there might be some benefit for running unofficial drills.

Question from member: Insurance reasons should there be a plan in place? - This is something we should be prepared to deal with.

Question from member: Is it worth having a wayjack down here? - No sure we can get at the lake in a hurry.

If there is a large fire suppressing it isn't feasible. Our goal would be to keep it from jumping to other buildings. We would need to focus on suppression and escapes. Ensuring there are fire alarms in all buildings. Fire alarms are tested every season.

Statement by member: Ski patrol needs a ladder for escapes out the window. Also the fire alarms are often unplugged. - Reply from the board: alarms should not be unplugged. If there is an alarm that is having an issue it needs to be reported immediately.

Question from member: Would there be money in the budget to create training for a volunteer fire department team? - Hard to create a "department" due to response times.

Statement by member: Did ski patrol just become a fire department? Laughs.

Statement by member: a grant for fire suppression would be a good idea.

Question from member: Would a sprinkler system work? - Sprinkler systems don't work because we are shut down mid-week. Storage tank underground would work.

Statement from member – there should be evacuation plans for every building – there are evacuation plans for each building.

6.13 Administration Report - Alec McBeath

- Insurance
 - Property insurance through MWRD – entire district is covered for \$33 million.
 - Value for various items is in the shared drive\Directors\Admin\Property Insurance
 - Liability insurance – applications is in. Cost last year was \$24,662
 - Directors & Officers Liability 5,000,000
 - Commercial General Liability 10,000,000
 - We get an in-person site inspection each year now
- Insurance rates are going down. Based on ski days from the last year.
- Insurance guy is coming back every year. He likes it here.
- Society
 - Post AGM file our annual report next year.
 - New Director Criminal Record Checks and Personal History forms -to be emailed
- Liquor License
 - Will be renewed
 - Special event license /beer garden - approved
 - New Deck is not licensed
 - We had an in-person inspection a year ago

- Reciprocals
 - CWSAA sign up has reduced the workload
 - We still exchange email with resorts and set up agreements
 - Updated reciprocal table in the shared drive under Directors\Reciprocals – this sheet then should go to the ticket booth so they can put together a binder to keep track of agreements and people who have used the offers. The website has a general explanation of the resorts as each resort reserves the right to change the deal and have blackout dates.
 - Skiers need ID and Cain Season pass with this year date; staff need a letter of introduction from their managers

Question from member: In the near past we were restricted to beside the lodge. - We were in two spots, one beside the lodge and one by ski patrol. With the new beer garden location we will need to send in the changed location. DM will walk and get a map of the new location.

Question from member: Is the front deck going to be licensed? - Started on the process and will take about a year but we can work towards that.

6.14 RV Park/Summer Ops Report

Regional district is wanting the RV site cleaned up.
Special use permits required by RDMW. Still negotiating with them.

Still working through the process of trying to get our base area expanded and possibly expand the RV area.

Reorganization of RVs to get them in bounds. Still in progress. Many difficult board meetings to get to this point.

Still need to figure out what to do with the old RV outhouse.

There are two areas to consider in this difficult decision. The controlled recreation area, and the base area. The base area is the area we can have structures on. The district felt some boot rooms were permanent.

Question from member: Are all RVs moving? - No just the ones outside the base area. The hope is to get our base area expanded so we can have structures there again, but we need to be in compliance first. There are a fair bit of negotiations yet, but we would have a better chance to expand if we amend and pull everyone back into the base area, then we can go into the process of expanding our boundaries.

We have asked to speak with the Namgis first. Our relationship with them is first and foremost. Then, we can go forward to the district.

This stuff moves slowly.

Question from member: Namgis approval is important to move forward with this who is our contact. - Bill Hunter. But we have not yet approached them yet as we need to have our ducks in a row and be in compliance, and everything will be contingent on our conversations with them.

Question from member: Is Bill Hunters map legal? - That is the lease area which is different than the base area (the controlled recreation area is the whole area, then we have a base area within that) the base is the area we hope to expand.

Digital maps are available too.

7. Questions from membership

Question from member: What about summer operations? - Darren and Kieren have taken it over. Summer ops are exploratory, and great ideas have come forward. Open to building a committee and Darren will pass on grooming first.

Question from member: Did we have a feasibility study? - North Island feasibility study focused on the opportunity would be feasible with a general manager year-round. Summer operations can be different than our winter ones and be event based not consistent. Fire is a major concern.
